#### TRADITIONAL TERRITORY ACKNOWLEDGEMENT





### **Developing Leaders**

The Rural Ontario Institute continues to embark on initiatives that build rural leaders and represent the critical rural voice on issues of importance to rural Ontario. With a commitment to developing strong leaders, ROI's leadership programs strive to impart the vision and commitment to lead change and ensure the sustainability of Ontario's agricultural economies and rural communities.

#### **Advanced Agricultural Leadership Program (AALP)**



#### **AALP Class 20 Milestones**

The 20 participants of Class 20 bring a range of backgrounds and educational experience to the class. Class members are livestock, horticulture, cannabis, grain and oilseed farmers and/or involved in agri-business and agri-food, financial sectors, non-government and commodity associations and small business. The Class ranges in age from 25 to 54. Participants come from as far east as Ottawa and as far west at Thedford. Delhi is the southern limit and Oakwood the northern limit in Ontario.

AALP Class 20 accomplished the following:

- · Seminars 1-3: Niagara-on-the-Lake, Sarnia and Toronto.
- · Webinars A C: Orientation, curriculum introduction/review/practice, World Soils Day, Canadian diplomacy and optimizing seminars.
- North American Study Tour: Washington DC and Florida.

- · Issues Analysis Projects: Small groups of Class 20 participants selected agricultural topics of interest through "Dragon's Den" pitches. Each will present on these topics and the team process in September 2024. The seven projects focus on the following topics:
  - Increasing adoption of Soil Health BMPs
  - Bitcoin, sowing the seeds of change
  - · Taking AALP National
  - Environmental Farmers
  - Financial literacy
  - · Local Food in Schools
  - Agriculture in the Classroom across Ontario

AALP workshop curriculum covered includes:

- · Global leadership competency framework (Gordon, 2021)
- · Class 20 Board meetings
- Ready for the future 360 leadership index, agents of adaptability, Gridworks team synergy, DiSC, DEI workshops
- · Mental health, alumni roundtables, MPP visits, elevator pitch, food justice, capital markets, precision fermentation
- Research Soils @ Guelph, round table about soil health conversations

#### **Recruitment for AALP Class 21**

We are now accepting nominations for AALP Class 21. You are an important part of the process! When interviewed, AALP participants say their reason for joining, in large part, is because someone encouraged them to do so. On average it took them 3 to 5 years to make their commitment and 2 nudges to get the confidence. Our objective is to see the full agriculture and food value chain represented from across all parts of Ontario. Farmers with operations of all sizes and types are encouraged to apply. Limited financial aid is available, and angels are welcomed. Out of province applicants have been accepted into the program in the past.



#### 2024 AALP Dream Gala



ROI is pleased to announce the record-breaking fundraising results of \$110,438 by the 2024 AALP Dream Gala. Initiated in 1984, AALP builds the skills and networks of individuals in the agriculture and food sector who in turn lead innovation and collaboration that contributes to economic, social and environmental good locally and globally. The theme of the April 2024 event, produced by AALP Class 19 and Class 20, transported attendees back in time to "The Roaring Twenties" and featured a semi-formal dinner, silent and live auction. The auction offered unique items and experiences, and featured a Giving Back item where fresh produce was donated to a local Foodbank in the buyer's name.

#### **Rural Change Makers (RCM)**



2023 was an exciting and transformative year for the Rural Change Maker Program, an initiative that builds youth leadership and rural development capacity throughout Ontario. It was year of leadership and economic development programming co-designed directly from the perspectives of hundreds of rural, remote and Indigenous youth engaged as part of the 2022 Young Rural Resilient Project. The outcome of

this collective approach was tremendous with applicants to the program spanning far and wide across Ontario including 24 First Nation communities in northwestern Ontario, Timmins, the Kawarthas, southwestern, central and eastern Ontario regions. Foundational program partnerships were formed early on in 2023 with Opiikapawiin Services LP (representing a collective of 24 First Nations working together on the Wataynikaneyap Transmission Project), Timmins Youth Wellness Hub and Community Futures Huron.

Thirty-two emerging leaders aged 18-35 began a shared leadership journey together in August of 2023 and undertook intensive self and core skill development ranging from Bridges Resource training, Indigenous Governance, Future Visioning, Communication & Leadership training to Fundraising, Financial Literacy, Project Management & Evaluation, Community Development and Civic Engagement. Change makers were led on this journey by the experience and skills of over 30 industry experts including City of Peterborough Social Services Bridges out of Poverty trainers, Libro Credit Union and Each One Teach One, Tanya Rumble Inclusive Fundraising, Trillium Youth Opportunities Fund Staff, Goodroots Consulting, Laura Calmwind Indigenous Leader and Elder, United Way of Perth- Huron, Community Futures Huron, ROI Project Leaders and Centre for First Nations Governance Open Space Facilitator Amsey Maracle. These curriculum partners brought a wealth of knowledge and understanding to change makers guiding them toward the creation of SMART action plans at an Ignite Action Weekend held at Camp Kintail on the shores of Lake Huron in January of 2024. This was an exciting and electric weekend for change makers where they began to put into practice all they had learned. Local municipal and community leaders from Huron County accompanied change makers at this event to mentor and coach the development of SMART plans for youth-led community initiatives.

Since then, change makers have been busy actioning their community plans, initiatives and enterprises. These young leaders are doing



incredible things in their lives and communities. To discover the full breadth of youth initiatives we encourage you to follow the journey of change makers on ROI Connect | Building Community.

We look forward to welcoming the next leaders of change to the 2024-25 program in the Fall and we thank the more than 30 regional partners coming alongside youth in the upcoming program. #### **BUILD Leadership Program**

ROI, carrying on from its roots, has been building leaders for decades. In the past year ROI has collaborated to plan, coordinate and deliver governance, leadership and/or strategic development workshops for the Canadian dairy future leaders, the Beef Farmers of Ontario, the Northern Producers Animal Health Network, the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies along with many other rural and agricultural organizations looking for advice on their member training strategy. It is rewarding to see the large percent of workshop attendees that go on to hold leadership roles on Boards at the community, provincial and federal level.

# Informing Stakeolders and **Supporting Collaboration**

#### **Rural Ontario Facts**

ROI continued publishing Rural Ontario Facts products in 2023. Factsheets provide insight and analysis of rural facts and trends featured in the dashboards.








#### **Rural Ecofootprint**

ROI continued our work with York University to calculate Ecofootprint and Biocapacity accounts for rural communities. We completed the calculations for all communities in Ontario. The results of this project will be presented as ecofootprint, biocapacity, and biocapacity balance indicators on ROI's Wellbeing Dashboard. Ecofootprint measures the demand on natural resources while biocapacity measures the supply of ecosystem services.



The results of this project show that rural areas have highly productive ecosystems that produce goods and services for people in Ontario. We look forward to raising awareness of the incredible contribution that rural communities are making to the wellbeing of Ontarians.

The chart below shows the biocapacity and ecofootprint accounts for rural Ontario (the unit of measure is global hectares per capita).



#### **Rural Community Wellbeing**

ROI is halfway through Phase 2 of this project. We established a Steering Committee with approved terms of reference and a consensus based decision making process. The project team developed a beta version of the dashboard with an improved design and user experience. Through engagement with rural communities and the Steering Committee, we finalized the list of indicators that will be displayed on the dashboard.



We welcomed 10 additional members to our focus group of Data Champions. We also attended over 50 meetings with 37 organizations to discuss opportunities for participation, collaboration, and data sharing. Through these meetings, we developed data-sharing

agreements with 3 organizations for insightful data about mental health, climate change, and the arts sector.

ROI shared information about this project at conferences and meetings throughout the year, including:

- Canadian Rural Revitalization Foundation Conference in Lethbridge, Alberta.
- Rural Ontario Municipal Association Conference in Toronto, Ontario.
- Rural Ontario Medical Program Resident Retreat, virtual.
- International Ecological Footprint Learning Lab, partners meeting in Toronto.

The project team is now testing the beta version of the dashboard with our focus group of Data Champions. We look forward to launching this innovative tool in 2024. When complete, this dashboard will enable rural communities to assess their wellbeing and measure progress over time. ROI hopes that this project will help remove barriers and build capacity in rural communities for data-driven decision making and performance measurement.

### **Rural Housing Information System** (RHIS)

The Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus (EOWC) was awarded \$1.2M in 2022 from CMHC's Housing Challenge to work with the Rural Ontario Institute (ROI) to develop a data solution to support affordable housing in rural communities. This digital tool provides local, reliable, salient, and current rural data to assist proponents & municipalities in the planning and construction of new affordable housing.

In 2023, the Rural Housing Information System was scaled from the 103 rural Eastern municipalities to the 120 rural Western municipalities with the support of South-Central Ontario Region Economic Development Corporation, Western Ontario Wardens Caucus, CMHC and Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affair's Rural Economic Development fund.



Utility training was provided for municipal members and promotion was provided to nonprofit and private housing sector groups.

In December, the Northern Policy Institute, Northwestern Ontario Municipal Association, Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities and FedNor came together to see the system expanded to the 145 municipalities of Northern Ontario over 2023-2026

Testimonials include the EOWC assessing dig ready properties for their regional 7 and 7 Build Project. The Rural Ontario Medical Program assessing the true cost of living of most of this site's featured municipalities to advocate to the Ministry of Health that intern nurses and doctors need higher living stipends to be placed in rural Ontario clinics and hospitals. And the County of Simcoe is adding their separated town's data to provide a comprehensive view of the actual cost of living in their region for their social sector service providers.

# Stakeholder Engagement & **Knowledge Sharing**

In the past year ROI has hosted, co-hosted or collaborated in over 32 virtual or in-person events. Through event facilitation and partnership with rural community stakeholders ROI addressed topics of interest including:

· Filling the housing information gap in

Eastern and Western Ontario and beyond

- · Making Rural Data Accessible Exploring Tools & Resources
- · Canadian Rural and Remote Housing and Homelessness
- Understanding governance, your personal leadership style and leading through change

In 2021, ROI launched the interactive engagement platform ROI Connect to support community development projects across the province and catalyze civic participation. Since then, the platform has welcomed over 100 new community members, 18 new community groups and over 30 community projects and initiatives shared on the site through project pages, blog contributions and member profiles. Community engagement on the site has expanded by over 150% since launch, giving community members throughout rural Ontario and beyond a platform to share their work, connect with others, join conversations and groups, and create their own online home to connect with community, share their events and raise awareness about local needs and opportunities.

ROI connect has also evolved to incorporate critical fundraising tools that garner support for programs and projects including the special AALP 40th anniversary celebration this year. These tools were also used to garner support for the purchase of books and resources for youth in the change maker program and with the generosity of donors like Ontario Mutual Insurance Association we were able to successfully reach our target and provide young leaders with the learning materials needed for their journey.





#### Ken McKinnon Memorial Fund

The Ken McKinnon Memorial Fund is a tribute to Ken McKinnon's leadership and service to Canadian agriculture and a commitment to excellence in future leaders. During his 21-year tenure at the Ontario Milk Marketing Board (now Dairy Farmers of Ontario), Ken played an integral role in leading changes that revolutionized milk production, pricing and marketing provincially and nationally. Through donations from individuals, businesses and organizations, this fund fosters the leadership qualities needed in rural Ontario in the years ahead.

#### William A. Stewart Endowment

The William A. Stewart Endowment was initiated in 1991 by the Agricultural Leadership Trust as a tribute to the late Ontario Minister of Agriculture and Food, the Honourable William A. Stewart. The fund recognizes and honours his legacy of public service, community involvement and leadership. The William A. Stewart Lecture & Reception – a prestigious public lecture event - is held every other year in London, ON as part of the final AALP seminar.

### **George Dmetriuc Memorial Fund**

The George Dmetriuc Memorial Fund was established by the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board (now Grain Farmers of Ontario) as part of the William A. Stewart Endowment in 1993. The fund exemplifies the spirit of George Dmetriuc as a leader in Ontario agriculture. Other commodity organizations, friends and associates contributed to this fund in recognition of George's contributions during his time as Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board chair from 1984 to 1992.

### W. Garfield Weston **Foundation Endowment**

The W. Garfield Weston Foundation originated in 1959 and is named in honour of Willard Garfield Weston, a Canadian who established successful business enterprises across Canada and around the world. The Foundation's mission states that grants support projects in Canada for the benefit of Canadians. The W. Garfield Weston Foundation Endowment was established upon receipt of contributions from the Foundation in 1994, 1995 and 1996.

#### **Dean Tiessen Memorial Fund**

The Dean Tiessen Memorial Fund honours the vision and memory of agriculture entrepreneur and AALP Class 10 graduate Dean Tiessen who died tragically in Brazil in 2013. Dean was president of New Energy Farms, was a catalyst in helping to establish Ontario's biomass sector and was a leader in the greenhouse vegetable industry. The fund will directly support AALP Classes 16 through 20 in their southwestern Ontario seminar themed "Dynamics of Change". Class 10 continues to accept donations toward this fund.


